COMMUNITY COUNSELING PROGRAM

The Department of Leadership and Counseling offers master of arts degree programs in college counseling, community counseling and school counseling.

The Community Counseling Program is a 48 semester hour master's degree program of studies that is intended for students who seek licensure as professional counselors and employment in community agency settings. Candidates who are selected for this program are expected to make a major commitment to their graduate level training and education as well as to enroll in course work on a regular basis. The program includes a 600 clock-hour supervised counseling internship experience. The Community Counseling Program is accredited by the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP), a specialized accrediting body that evaluates and grants accreditation to graduate-level programs in professional counseling. The program meets the academic and internship requirements for limited licensure as a professional counselor (LLPC) in the State of Michigan. Information on full licensure as a professional counselor is available in the Student Handbook for Counseling Programs.

Admission applications are processed in order for candidates to begin studies in the Winter, Spring, Summer and Fall. To be considered for the admission process, a completed application including transcripts, statement of intent, resume, recommendations and other assessment(s) that may be necessary must be submitted to Graduate Admissions, P.O. Box 970, Eastern Michigan University Ypsilanti, MI 48197 by:

- **February 10th for Spring admission**
- **March 1st for Summer admission**
- **May 15th for Fall admission**
- **September 15th for Winter admission**

Admission Requirements

To be considered for admission, candidates must meet all graduate school requirements and, in addition, submit the following for program admission. All admission materials, both graduate school and program, are to be submitted to the Graduate Admissions Office.

1. Applicants must have graduated from a regionally accredited institution.
2. Evidence of academic aptitude for graduate-level study, that includes at least one of the following:
 - a. A 2.75 overall undergraduate grade point average or a 3.00 grade-point average in the second half of the undergraduate degree program.
 - b. A graduate grade-point average of 3.3 on a previously completed advanced degree.
 - c. A combined score (Verbal and Quantitative) of at least 850 with a Writing score of at least 3.5 on the Graduate Record Examinations (GRE). The GRE scores may not be more than five years old.
 - d. Applicants not meeting other criteria, but having an acquired knowledge of the counseling field based on a minimum of three years of related experience and references, may also be eligible for admission. Individuals applying under this provision must contact the Coordinator of Advising for specific procedures prior to application to the Graduate School.
3. International students must meet the following additional criteria:
 - a. An official score report from either the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or the Michigan English Language Assessment Battery (MELAB) must be sent by the testing service directly to the University. Student copies will not be accepted. Contact the testing service for more information. A conditional admission may be available to those students falling just below the minimum score requirements.
4. **Statement of Intent:** A one-page narrative statement focusing on the applicant's motivation and rationale for seeking admission to the Community Counseling Program as well as his or her background and goals related to professional studies
5. **Résumé:** A focused, summary of program relevant educational, career, and/or life experiences
6. **Three Recommendations:** These must be completed on recommendation rating forms available from the Department of Leadership and Counseling. They should be completed by professionals with knowledge of the applicant's suitability for graduate work (e.g., supervisors or undergraduate professors).

Admission Requirements (continued)

Each applicant will receive a rating on the following criteria: academic potential based on grade-point average; the quality, extensiveness and relevance of career/life/educational experiences to the field of community counseling; professional goals/objectives; and recommendations. Based on these ratings, applicants may move to the second phase of the process.

Applicants admitted to the second phase of the selection process will be invited to campus to participate in a personal interview. They will also receive information about programs of study, faculty expectations, and related topics such as professional counselor licensure. Applicants may be asked to submit additional materials at this time. Based on evaluation of all materials and the interviews, admissions decisions will be made.

The admissions appeal procedure provides each applicant with the opportunity to formally appeal the admissions decision. Appeals must be based on an applicant's perception that his/her due process rights were violated during the admissions process. The procedure is not intended for applicants who do not meet minimum standards for admission as outlined above. Appeal must begin within five working days of the start of the semester following the admissions decision. Applicants wishing to appeal must contact the Coordinator of Advising to obtain written information regarding the appeal procedure.

Program advisers will be assigned after students have been admitted to the Community Counseling Program. The adviser will assist the student in developing the program of graduate study that is required for full admission to the community counseling program. All courses and subsequent changes must be approved by the adviser. Transfer credit can be used toward graduation only if it has been reviewed and accepted by the student's adviser and is within Graduate School guidelines. The master's degree program must be **completed within a six-year period**.

5. Elective Courses (0-5 Semester Hours)

Elective courses are selected from the following list with the approval of the adviser and reflect the student's professional needs and objectives. For many students, 5 credit hours of elective coursework will not be enough to train them to work in the settings in which they will seek employment. It is strongly recommended that students take elective coursework in substance abuse counseling, marriage/family counseling, and grant/proposal writing. In addition, students who have not had coursework in psychology (i.e. abnormal psychology, theories of personality, etc.) will be encouraged to do so. It is possible that some students will want to develop a program that contains more than 48 semester hours. The student and his/her advisor will carefully review the student's education and experience in planning the program of studies.
