In Sweden in the summer of 2000, she met EMU Music Professor Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra, who encouraged her to come here for her graduate work.

Ausra began her stint as a graduate assistant in September 2001. She appreciates all of the support she has received from Ruiter-Feenstra and David Woike, the head of the music department.

For the competition, Ausra performed "A Walpurgis Night" from "Faust" by Peter Eben. Eben is a contemporary Czech composer whom Ausra met four years ago.

She said Eben knows the organ extremely well and that

the piece was technically challenging, but fun to play. Based on the Faust story by Goethe, this piece was originally written for the stage, and "you can hear witches flying and screaming," Ausra said.

Ausra and her husband, Vidas, one of last year's music award winners, will both graduate this year and are applying to doctoral pro-

Every fair presenter is a success story. EMU Communications and Theatre Department Head Dennis Beagen shared one of these stories with me recently, and I'd like to pass it along to you.

Michael Goodwyn received his B.A. from Eastern in 1977. He was a member (with EMU Professor Judith Sturgis Hill) of EMU's first national-champion forensics team and a teammate of former U.S. Secretary of Transportation Rodney Slater.

Michael returned to EMU in 1999 to pursue a master's degree in theatre. For his thesis project, he wrote a play, "Dimensions of a Blackman," for which he was also the producer, director, and lead actor. The production received rave reviews, won the CTA/Graduate School's Artistic Award in 2001, and was featured at the Graduate Research Fair.

After leaving EMU, he taught speech, English, and theatre in a Florida high school, and recently took a secondary teaching position in California in order to be closer to the theatre and film industry. Before leaving Florida, he sent a copy of "Dimensions of a Blackman" to the premier black-theatre ensemble in Los Angeles, the Unity Players Ensemble. Within three days of arriving in L.A., Michael and his wife, Shari (also an EMU alum), learned that his script was selected for a four-week production run at the legendary Stella Adler Theatre (across from Grauman's Chinese Theatre) in late February 2003.

Michael Goodwyn acknowledges the support of his mentors on the CTA faculty: Wallace Bridges, Kerry Graves, Kathy Stacey, Gary Evans, the late Karen Smith Meyer, and Patricia Zimmer.

That's just one story. There are 100 more at the Graduate Research Fair. We hope you'll get a chance to meet some of the presenters in person and learn more about their scholarly and creative projects.

One of them just may be the next Michael Goodwyn!

Graduate student winners excel in theatre and writing

Ric Roberts has been announced as a winner of the Communication and Theatre Arts Award for Achievement in Arts. Roberts, a native of Saginaw, received his bachelor of arts degree from Saginaw Valley State University. He has been a graduate assistant in the Drama/Theatre for the Young program since Fall 2001, and he also teaches public speaking.

Roberts wrote and directed the Family Day show "Little Red and the Three Pigs." Roberts provides study guides for all of the shows, handles bookings for the touring



company, and directed the Lab Theatre production of "Wiley and the Hairy Man."

He has studied with Mike Nichols' New Actors Workshop in New York and was encouraged by his personal

acting coach to stay in the city and audition for shows there. He was almost immediately cast (out of 225 hopefuls) as the lead in "That's Life," a musical review of the life of contemporary Jewish people in New York

City.

However, he returned to Michigan and completed his degree at SVSU, where he is the director of the Summer Theatre Institute and the Fine Arts Day Camp. As his thesis project, he founded the Mid-Michigan Youth Theatre. Next fall, he will complete his internship at the Flint Youth Theatre.

Roberts' dream job is to work at SVSU with Janet Rubin, who originally encouraged him to go to New York and continues to mentor him. He also has the highest praise for the faculty in EMU's CTA Department.

Physics professor will deliver Sigma Xi keynote

The Graduate Research Fair Planning Committee is pleased to announce that Dr. Jacqueline Krim will be the Sigma Xi Keynote speaker at 7:30 p.m. in the McKenny Union Ballroom.

Dr. Krim is a professor of physics at North Carolina State University. Her research interests include nanoscale science and technology, solid-film growth processes and topologies at sub-micron length scales, and nanotribology (the study of friction, wear, and lubrication at atomic length and time scales).

She is a Fellow of the American

Physical Society and the American Vacuum Society, a Sigma Xi distinguished lecturer for 2001-2003, and a recipient of a Presidential Young Investigator award from the NSF. She has published and lectured widely on the topic of the atomic-scale origins of friction.



Krim

Dr. Krim's talk after the Research Fair is entitled "Micro-Electro-Mechanical Systems: These Squeaky

Wheels Will Get No Grease." Krim will discuss the remarkable trend of tiny machines that go anywhere, including the human body — where science fiction meets reality.

Micro-Electro-Mechanical Systems (MEMS) are an emerging, cutting-edge technology that relies on the micro-fabrication of small-scale mechanical components and their integration with on-board electronic processing.

It is widely believed that MEMS devices, which will be used in such diverse applications as gas and pressure sensors, accelerometers, chemi-

cal analytic "microlaboratories," and airborne "nanosatellites," will dominate the future. Because MEMS devices react to mechanical signals, many employ construction topologies that require physical motion and the concomitant lubrication that prevents heating and wear of the device. There is an increasingly pressing need to carry out new and fundamental research relevant to the development of optimal sub micron-scale mechanical systems. This talk will address how knowledge of the fundamental origins of friction can be applied to MEMS technology.

grams at several universities in the U.S. But, ultimately, they would like to return to Lithuania. Ausra said she hopes to be a professional performer and perhaps a church organist.

EunHee Jung, pianist, is the other music department award winner. Jung is from Seoul, South Korea, and has studied piano since she was five years old.

She was admitted to EMU's Music Depart-

ment in 1998 and has studied since then with Joseph Gurt. Jung's favorite composers are Chopin and Debussy. But for the Graduate Performance Competition, she played "Sonata No. 3 Op. 28" by Sergei Prokofiev. She described the piece as both challenging and showy.

This is the third time Jung competed for this award, so she was very glad when she won. She believed that this might be her last opportunity,

saying, "Three strikes, you're out!"

In addition to Gurt, Jung credited and thanked Diane Winder for being a challenging professor of music.

Eunhee hopes for a career as a professional accompanist. She already has a master's degree in piano accompaniment and plans to transfer to the University of Michigan to complete her second master's in piano performance.

Mansell, a native of Michigan, received his bachelor's degree from EMU in 1999 with a double major in film and imaginative writing. His area of expertise is in film and screenwriting, and he also has completed an internship in radio and TV.

After he earns his master's degree in creative writing, Mansell plans to continue to freelance in the areas of prose and screenplays, and is seeking representation and publication. He also plans to continue working in the area, producing documentaries and cultural programming, and would like to be involved in education in media literacy.

Jennifer Buehler, English language and literature, and **Chandana Sumithrarachchi**, chem-

istry, were awarded first place in the Graduate Student Thesis Competition. Buehler's thesis, "Don't Take Away My Books: The Meanings of Readings in the Life of One Teenager," was an ethnographic study of a teenage reader. Buehler wanted to understand the meaning and value of young adult novels read by one particular student, consider at-risk, but an avid reader. She wanted to apply this insight to her classroom work.

Sumithrarachchi's thesis, "Measurement of

Absolute Gamma Emission Probabilities" involved developing a new technique to determine gamma emission properties with a high degree of accuracy.
