# Note from the Director



Dr. Jeffrey L. Bernstein

Many of you know that two of my true loves are baseball and numbers. Bill James, one of the great baseball analysts, commented in an article some years ago that a true baseball fan can read a line of statistics and see the player. If I told you, for example, about a first baseman who hit .240 with 25 home runs, and about a centerfielder who hit .300 while stealing 30 bases, you can picture each player, down to their body types, based on just this description. My love for baseball, and my respect for what numbers can teach us, led me to immensely enjoy *Moneyball*, Michael Lewis's brilliant study of how a new generation of baseball executives use advanced statistics and analytics to give themselves a leg up on the grizzled veterans who insist on doing things the old way.

This issue of the MPA newsletter features three of our alumni who have been part of the increasing use of data, and analytics, in the field of public administration. Their work in a wide range of areas within the field suggests that the ability to understand data — its uses and limitations, and how to make better decisions when informed by data — is one of the most important skillsets we can teach our students. We are pleased to feature Nate Geinzer, Laura Shue, and Brittany Beaster, all of whom have been exemplars of this trend, in this edition of the newsletter.

I've been teaching in the MPA program for about fourteen years now and am struck by how our methods curriculum has always been in somewhat a state of flux, as we continually seek to adjust what we do to meet the needs of our students, and the field. I have personally enjoyed many conversations over the years with my colleagues as we seek to make the research methods course connect up with the statistics course in the best way possible, and as we seek to integrate the new capstone into the training we provide our students.

I always share with my students the fact that you *never* want to be at the mercy of someone with whom you are working because they understand something that you do not. When your co-workers understand statistics, or research design, or data-based decision making, and you do not, you are at a disadvantage. While we know that very few of our students will end up doing high-level statistics, we also know that all of you will end up having to make judgments based upon the statistical work of others. This drive for more data, and better data, will be a hallmark of our field (in fact, it is at the heart of our reaccreditation process through NASPAA, the Network of Schools of Public Policy, Affairs, and Administration). We are pleased to be part of this trend in training professionals who are ready for the data-based future public administration will confront in the years to come.

# FOCUS ON FLEISCHMANN

After seven years as the Political Science Department Head, Dr. Arnie Fleischmann will be returning to the faculty. We are very grateful for his leadership and support. When asked how he was enjoying his new status, he replied, "I'm ecstatic!" While on sabbatical, he has had the opportunity to stay active with research, course proposals, book proposals (a textbook titled Understanding Urban Politics: Institutions, Participation, and Policies), and publication in the area of urban taxation. Dr. Fleischmann's interest in state and local politics continues to drive his research, particularly in politics and growth and economic development, and he has completed writings about annexation politics. Dr. Fleischmann reports that he will be helping out with undergraduate advising. He will also be returning to the classroom for the winter semester teaching PLSC 565: Local Government and Politics.

#### A CLOSER LOOK: DATA IN THE FIELD

Our alums and members of our MPA Advisory Board share their perspectives on how data is collected and applied.



Laura Shue, 2011 MPA alum, is currently the Director of Health Data Quality, Compliance and Operations at the University of Michigan Health System. With regard to the value of data, she writes: "The conditions that gave rise to big data are etched in stone from a historical context, and no amount of regulatory or policy changes will reverse that. The horse is out of the gate. Big data is here to stay. Having well-developed skills in data management, data analysis, and critical thinking will continue to be important drivers of your success."

Nate Geinzer, 2006 MPA alum and City Manager of Brighton, MI, highlights benefits of data in a municipal setting. "There is potential for data to play a larger role in the day-to-day operations of a City. Having staff with the ability to process and make recommendations based on data is critically important to developing creative ahead-of-the-curve service delivery solutions. Staff positions were whittled down to the most essential functions during the recession. All of these lost positions will not be coming back, and local government managers having to do more with less is not changing anytime soon. Local governments have been conditioned and incentivized to take a reactionary approach to data. We produce data to meet the requirements of regulations, state agencies, and/or public request. The focus on metrics (think "dashboards") provides limited value. What brings value is first recognizing that data is more than just quantitative. Often times, the qualitative data tells the "real" story and makes for better informed decision making. As staff, our job is to weigh these inputs to provide the quality services our residents and businesses expect."





Brittany Beaster, 2014 MPA alum and Data Governance Analyst at General Motors, describes her experiences working with data. "I have been afforded several rewarding opportunities to work with applied data in my career. As a Program Analyst at Mathematica Policy Research, my team worked directly with the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services to support the analysis of the Transformed Medicaid Statistical Information System — a database used to collect Medicaid health claims data from the 50 states. Such analyses, focused on healthcare spending and utilization, provided administrators with information regarding the most prevalent healthcare needs and common illnesses within their populations. These analyses could also be used to shed light on opportunities for earlier health interventions, and reduction of spending through optimization of delivery models. In my current role as a Data Governance Analyst at General Motors, my team partners with Human Resources to standardize and improve employee data that is collected, maintained, and reported on in operations across the globe. This type of data management and analysis is applied to support core business processes — such as

onboarding and payroll — and is also used in analytics to improve the success of recruiting and speedier hiring processes."

#### Ethics and Public Administration

An esteemed professor in the EMU MPA program once poignantly stated to his class: "Ethics is hard." While this may seem simplistic, it is nonetheless the truth, and ethics is made more difficult by

the fact that it is often taken for granted. We envision ourselves being the voice of reason. We are thus able to reassure ourselves, "If I were working in the department responsible for the Flint water fiasco, surely things would have been different."

Historically, ethics is the turf of philosophers. As they are wont to do, philosophers have taken a complex issue and made it exceedingly more complex. During my time in the MPA program, I engaged in an independent study that examined how Chinese philosophy contributed to what we today call public administration. I chose China for several reasons. China is a large, diverse, ancient culture with a need for quality administration on a large scale. I felt there was something of a western slight toward China in our current curriculum. I also wanted my study to be relevant to the future, and we are fast approaching a Chinese moment in world history. Chris Preston, Second year MPA Student and Graduate Assistant Internship: Michigan Department of Transportation – Office of Business Development

"At the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) - Office of Business Development (OBD), I was given the opportunity to be a student assistant. The OBD certifies Disadvantage Business Enterprises (DBE), owned by female and minority entrepreneurs. In addition, OBD conducts Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) compliance reviews for contractors receiving federal funds. During my tenure with OBD, I was able to gain practical work experience in both of these areas by conducting field interviews, DBE certifications, and EEO compliance reviews. Seeking an internship that provides practical work experience in your future field is critical. My success in finding internships has rested on my ability to seek out opportunities not conveniently advertised through Eastern Michigan University. Attending professional development seminars and searching field-specific job boards will set you apart. My experience in OBD has led to an interview for an analyst position in the very office I interned at. Interning should be viewed as an extension of your education and the start of your

professional career."



Melissa Benson, Second year MPA Student and Graduate Assistant Internship: Health Information Management Department, University of Michigan Health System

"Pursuing an MPA degree, as well as a graduate certificate in Management of Public Healthcare Services, was a perfect fit with a summer internship with the Health Information Management (HIM) Department at the University of Michigan Health System. I worked on defining the Legal Health Record policy, which specifies which healthcare records will be released for legal purposes. One of the most valuable skills I learned was how policy is formulated from the ground up. The skills I learned were predicated upon understanding how federal and state legislation and governing bodies regulate healthcare practices. My internship experience in the HIM department complemented my MPA coursework. The foundational knowledge I developed in our personnel and strategic management classes was extremely helpful. The strategic management course provides students with the opportunity to learn how to identify issues, organize a strategy for resolution, and seek long-term solutions."



Alexa Timmreck, First year MPA Student and Graduate Assistant Internship: Citizens Research Council of Michigan

"I was fortunate enough this fall to spend time interning with the Citizens Research Council of Michigan, a nonpartisan, nonprofit, public policy research organization. My tasks included completing research and producing policy memos related to issues involving state and local government within Michigan. The opportunity to apply the policy analysis skills and writing skills that I've learned in classes to important issues that directly affect me was academically and professionally invaluable. Coming in to work every day meant getting the chance to learn something new. As a traditional student with limited work experience, completing internships has been an integral part of my education at EMU."
