#### **Introduction to Law and Courts**

This course will focus on the role that courts play in the American political system. The topics we will examine include the organization of the federal and state court systems; aspects of the legal profession; judicial behavior; methods of choosing judges; decision making in the criminal and civil justice systems; and policymaking in appellate courts, with special focus on the U.S. Supreme Court and its relationships with other actors in the political system. Throughout our discussions, we will emphasize that courts are political as well as legal institutions, and that much of the decision making in judicial systems is characterized by discretion rather than formality or certainty.

PLSC 217 Introduction to Law and Courts A survey of U.S. federal court organization and state court systems, methods of judicial selection, trial and appellate court decision-making processes, and the impact of judicial policies. Comparisons to legal systems outside the United States will be made. In the American context, courts are political as well as legal institutions. Thus, the area of law and 43 courts is a primary subfield of the political science discipline. A student's knowledge of the discipline will be enhanced by examining the ways in which the judiciary resolves disputes, shapes behavior, and interacts with other entities in the political system, such as legislatures, executives, bureaucratic agencies, and interest groups. Attention will be given to how political scientists examine court processes and the way in which both qualitative and quantitative research methods are used to further our understanding of courts in the United States. As such, PLSC 217 meets the outcomes for a course in the Knowledge of the Disciplines, Social Science Category.
