President's Report EASTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY

Board of Regents June 26, 2025

Chairman Ford and Distinguished Members of the Board of Regents,

This month, the spirit of the season has been unmistakable -- energizing our campus with celebrations that reflect the very heart of who we are. Most notably, we've honored Pride Month and Juneteenth, two occasions that invite both celebration and reflection. These moments underscore our identity as a university committed to fostering an inclusive and welcoming community for all.

Today, I am pleased to recommend for approval a General Fund operating budget of \$321.5 million for the 2025–26 fiscal year. This budget is more than a financial plan -- it's a statement of values. It reflects our steadfast focus on academic excellence and expanding student opportunity.

At Eastern, access is not just a goal -- it's a commitment. Roughly 68% of all EMU students, and an impressive 90% of first-year students, receive financial aid. Our Eastern Tuition Advantage scholarship, for example, offers free undergraduate tuition to students with a 3.0 GPA and a household income below \$60,000. Paired with programs like the Presidential Scholarship and the 4WARD Graduation Scholarship, we are removing financial barriers and opening doors to brighter futures.

Even amidst rising operational costs and shifting state support, our priorities remain unchanged: student success and a high-quality, inclusive academic experience.

As part of that continued excellence, we're delighted to welcome two new deans to EMU, whose appointments were just confirmed through the consent agenda:

- Dr. Amy Hietapelto will begin her role as dean of the College of Business on July 16. She brings over two decades of leadership experience and comes to us from the University of Minnesota Duluth, where she served as dean of the Labovitz School of Business and Economics.
- Dr. Carol Bishop Mills will join us August 1 as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Most recently associate dean for Faculty Success at Florida Atlantic University, she has also led the School of Communication and Multimedia Studies there.

Their arrivals mean we must also extend heartfelt gratitude and best wishes to Deans Dana Heller and Tom Traynor, who are retiring after distinguished tenures at EMU. On behalf of the entire university community, we thank them for their enduring impact.

Turning to recent accomplishments, I'm proud to highlight achievements that exemplify the vibrancy of our academic community:

- 22 faculty members are being recommended for sabbatical leave, supporting research and creative pursuits across a wide range of disciplines.
- 43 faculty members are receiving Faculty Research and Creative Activity Fellowships, granting them time to advance projects that promise future scholarship and external funding.
- Assistant Professor Matthew Kautz was awarded a prestigious National Academy of Education/Spencer Postdoctoral Fellowship for his research on school discipline.
- Professors Aesha Mustafa and Kimberley Barker will take part in the inaugural TEDx Ypsilanti, scheduled for tomorrow.
- Students Nicholas Mullaney and Aspenn Armstrong have been selected as Fulbright English Teaching Fellowship finalists, joining an elite group from over 4,000 applicants. Nicholas will head to Germany; Aspenn to Thailand.
- Students Kelly Crank and Victoria MacLean are recipients of the Gilman Scholarship, supporting international study for Pell Grant recipients. Kelly will study in Japan, Victoria in Costa Rica.
- Our Forensics Team earned an impressive third-place national finish at April's NFA National Tournament, outpacing peers from over 50 institutions, including Berkeley and Rice.
- The student-led Baja Racing Club returned to national competition with distinction, placing second among Michigan colleges at this year's SAE event in Maryland -- edging out teams from Michigan State, Lawrence Tech, and others.

Recognition

- Honors College students Trinity Perkins and Jeanne Sandouno have been named Ford Motor Company Fund John Dingell Fellows and selected to participate in The Washington Center's Academic Internship Program.
- Jason Folk, an Honors College student pursuing a double major in philosophy and communications, was selected for the 2025 Student Voting Honor Roll by the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge. Folk also served on the Michigan Collegiate Student Advisory Task Force.
- EMU's Game Design program ranked No. 16 in the Midwest and No. 3 in Michigan in the 2025 Game Design School Rankings by Animation Career Review.
- Heather Hutchins-Wiese, professor and co-director of the Dietetics and Human Nutrition program, is leading a regional sustainability initiative aimed at reducing food waste in Southeast Michigan. Through a collaboration with Make Food Not Waste, a Detroit-based nonprofit, she is helping six major Metro Detroit cities— Southfield, Dearborn, Livonia, Farmington Hills, Westland, and Canton—develop comprehensive food waste prevention blueprints tailored to their communities.

Of Note

- EMU is revolutionizing health education for young leaders with the launch of Way Forward@EMU, an innovative initiative supported by a \$1,016,850 grant from the Toyota Way Forward Fund. Designed to empower high school students from Ypsilanti, Wayne/Westland, and Romulus, the program bridges health education with career readiness, equipping participants with tools to drive real community impact.
- EMU's APEX (Atmospheric Physics Experiment) students are taking science to new heights. In collaboration with teams across the country, EMU students Joud Bahemriz, Nathan Guerra, and Isaac Thompson recently launched a high-altitude weather balloon as part of a national initiative to measure changes in galactic cosmic rays during periods of heightened solar activity. The mission aimed to study a rare event known as the Forbush Decrease—a dip in galactic cosmic rays caused when a coronal mass ejection from the sun disrupts the Earth's magnetic field. APEX is a NASA-funded project to make atmospheric measurements from high-altitude weather balloons during solar eclipses.

How optimism and positivity can enhance our lives has been the recent subject
of the "Enlighten U," a mental health podcast for students. The podcast can be
found on EMU's YouTube channel and is available from podcast services.

- EMU student-athletes set a school record with a 3.472 cumulative GPA following the Winter 2025 semester. It was also the 31st consecutive semester of earning higher than a 3.0 cumulative GPA.
