SUPPORTING EMU DIVERSITY: A FACULTY RESOURCE GUIDE

This guide has been assembled by the Faculty Senate's Task Force on Campus Climate, Race, and Diversity Issues. It is a compilation of the resources available across campus and in the local community that support the needs of our diverse student body. The guide has two sections: Resources Available to Students and Faculty Frequently Asked Questions. The first focuses on faculty as "first responders" for students in crisis, ensuring that we can help students access the resources and support they need. It also provides an overview of campus resources that address particular students' needs for faculty to use in advising. Whenever possible, we include the contact information of campus staff available for consultation. Faculty FAQ provides resources and information for faculty in their work making EMU a welcoming and equitable environment, from course design to conflict resolution. This guide will be updated annually. We welcome recommendations of additional resources not listed here (contact cneufeld@emich.edu or kjudd2@emich.edu).

I am concerned about a particular course where I am seeing trend in moderate to high drop out/fail rates particularly among historically marginalized students:

- Consider creating a <u>Supplemental Instructor</u> for your course through the Holman Success Center. Supplemental instruction at EMU offers support for gateway undergraduate courses, such as general education and/or program gateway courses with high enrollment and moderate-to-high drop or fail rates. SI also supports a small number of courses within majors that include difficult and highly-concentrated content where students often request help.

How can I address the high cost of textbooks that my students require?

The EMU Library Textbook Affordability Initiative provides:

- a large number of course ebooks purchased with grant and foundation funds
- a <u>Textbook Alternatives guide</u> instructors can use to explore free or low-cost text options
- an online form for instructors to request library ebook versions of course books
- increasingly popular consultations with a <u>subject specialist librarian</u> on finding free or less expensive options for course readings,
- presentations or workshops for departments on how to find and use open resources and alternatives, which can be tailored to specific disciplines.

CONCERNING INTERPERSONAL DYNAMICS

Individual Student Concerns:

I am worried about a student who may be in crisis, but they have not communicated with me about their situation. Is there anything I can do?

Office of Wellness and Community Responsibility (OWCR)- During the campus closure the OWCR will be offering on demand Wellness Check-Ins. These online meetings will provide students with an opportunity to work with an OWCR staff member to generate plans for maintaining or enhancing emotional, spiritual, intellectual, physical, environmental, financial, occupational, and social wellness. Faculty and Staff may request that the OWCR reach out to a student and offer this service by emailing us at EMU_OWCR@EMICH.EDU.

Note: If you are concerned specifically about a student's mental health, submit a CARE report instead.

What should I do when a student discloses experiencing sexual discrimination or assault?

EMU Sexual Misconduct and Sexual Discrimination Policy (8-14-2020):

All regular EMU employees are Mandatory Reporters, except for those few employees who are considered Confidential Employees (as described in Section XIV). A Mandatory Reporter is required to immediately report to the University's Title IX Coordinator and DPS all relevant details (obtained directly or indirectly) about an incident of Prohibited Conduct that involves any member of the EMU community ("students", "employees" and "third parties") as a Complainant, Respondent, and/or witness.

What can I do if I suspect that a student is experiencing domestic/interpersonal violence but I don't know how to approach them about it?

I am concerned about a student whose challenges with English as a foreign language are impeding their ability to successfully complete the coursework.

BEHAVIORAL ISSUES

When should I submit a CARE report?

The Student Intervention Team (SIT) addresses reports of troubling (inappropriate, disruptive, or harmful) student behavior in order to recommend proactive and non-punitive approaches aimed at helping students achieve success. Reporting categories include: distressed behavior; general mental/emotional health; medical; self harm; suicidal thoughts/statements; Title IX; bias incident.

 <u>CARE Report form</u>: Tip: Although the form asks for the details of an "inciting incident," if there has not been a specific incident, simply use the comments section to clarify your concerns.

- If you are worried that the student is struggling or presents a threat to the community but the student has not violated the Code of Community Responsibility, submit a <u>CARE Report</u>.

The Role of the Ombuds Office: https://www.emich.edu/ombuds/

The Ombuds Office office provides timely, objective and strategic information in a confidential manner to assist with the interpretation of university policies and procedures. The office is a neutral body working to ensure adherence to EMU policy, confirm due process, and assist with resolution and prevention of both academic and non-academic concerns.
