President's Report EASTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY

Board of Regents April 20, 2023

Madam Chair and Distinguished Members of the Board of Regents:

The higher education environment is as challenged as it has ever been in my 14 years as a university president, of course the last seven of which has been here at Eastern. The challenges are many: the declining population of high school students; the reduction in the number of graduating high schoolers who choose to pursue a degree; funding challenges on the state level; and, a variety of other factors.

This new landscape for higher education and the budgetary challenges it has created impacts the work all of us who have dedicated our lives to in preparing students for future careers, as well as the livelihood of those employed at universities across the country.

Institutions must become more nimble, creative and innovative than ever to identify new sources of revenue to invest in student and employee success.

This is why Eastern, as approved by our Board of Regents a short time ago, is entering into an innovative utilities and infrastructure partnership, Eagle Energy Partners. This pioneering initiative will deliver significant and sustainable enhancements to the overall campus experience for students, faculty and staff, and will benefit the University immediately and for decades in the future.

The partnership will generate a multi-million-dollar influx of outside funds to the University to:

- Further support Eastern's strong sustainability efforts and energy conservation measures, while making the University even more "green";
- Provide immediate and long-term solutions to deferred maintenance of older buildings and modernize the aging utility infrastructure; and,
- Create a continuous income stream to support academic programs and strategic enrollment and retention initiatives. The plan also establishes a distinctive opportunity for students, faculty and staff to develop projects to support enrollment and retention objectives.

The partnership is the first of its kind among Michigan public universities, and among only a handful that have been formed across the country at universities such as Ohio State, Georgetown and the University of Idaho.

Speaking of great news, we have two important events following this meeting that I encourage you to attend.

At 3 p.m., we will host a reception in recognition of Professor of Political Science Barbara Patrick. Dr. Patrick is the newly named recipient of the Distinguished Woman in Higher Education Leadership Award by the Michigan American Council on Education Women's Network – known as Michigan ACE. We hope you can join us across the hallway in room 205.

At 4 p.m., as you heard earlier, we will host a groundbreaking event for the new Windgate Arts Complex on the north side of campus. Our sincere thank you to the driving force behind this initiative, Director of the School of Art and Design, Professor Sandra Murchison.

As I conclude, there are two important items to note.

Please join me in celebrating the success of the Forensics team, which earned second place in a national competition last weekend. Gavin Millard, a sophomore majoring in public relations, was named national champion in dramatic interpretation, becoming Eastern's first national champion in this category.

On Sunday, August 30, we will honor 1,900 new graduates. Commencement ceremonies are always the highlight of the academic year and I look forward to joining many of you as we celebrate the class of 2023!

Of Note

- Eastern Michigan University has received a generous gift from the **Diane & Bruce Halle Foundation** to upgrade and modernize the University's **Bruce T. Halle Library**,
 a key resource for thousands of students, faculty and staff, and community residents
 since it opened in 1998.
- Engage@EMU recently launched the Ypsilanti Intergenerational Community
 Solutions Institute (YICSI) to reduce social isolation and improve health outcomes for
 all generations. Engage@EMU, Generations United, and the Ypsilanti Senior
 Center are collaborating to facilitate the YISCI, an intergenerational training and
 design institute that will bring together key stakeholders in Washtenaw County for a
 series of gatherings to learn about intergenerational issues and plan intergenerational
 initiatives. The program has received a \$60,000 grant from the Michigan Health
 Endowment Fund.
- The **TRUEMU Night at the Detroit Red Wings** was attended by more than 350 University alumni, employees, students, and friends, and raised more than **\$1,700** for

the **EMU Student Emergency Fund**. **TRUENMU Night at the Detroit Pistons** was attended by more than 270 alumni, employees, students, and friends, raising more than \$1,360 for the **EMU Student Emergency Fund**.

- The College of Health and Human Services celebrated the opening of the Center for Interprofessional Education, Research and Practice (CIERP) on April 12. The Center is designed to prepare students for multidisciplinary teams in health care and human service settings and uses interprofessional education (IPE), a priority for accreditation in most health care disciplines today, to provide students with the foundation to engage with one another and prepare for excellence in practice.
- Eastern Michigan University recently created a mental health support group for students of color in collaboration with the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), the University of Michigan's Wolverine Wellness, and Washtenaw Community College. Known as NAMI Campuses in Color, the group provides a community of support to students of color who have struggled or are currently struggling with depression, anxiety, or other mental health issues. EMU's Center of Race and Ethnicity (CORE) and EMU Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) will act as EMU's sponsors in the partnership.
- To prepare future job seekers for popular careers, EMU's Center for Digital Engagement, with support from Ann Arbor SPARK, is offering 48 paid internship positions through the Digital Summer Clinic. The internships provide valuable experience for students in digital marketing and tech, guidance in creating a professional portfolio and weekly opportunities to connect with mentors and industry professionals.
- Self-care is the topic of a series of writing workshops hosted by EMU's Office
 of Campus and Community Writing and its community writing resource, YpsiWrites,
 in collaboration with Washtenaw County Health Department's Wish You Knew
 mental health campaign. The workshops will be held in April on campus or via Zoom to
 promote community mental wellness and provide writers of all ages with tools for
 navigating daily stresses.
- The EMU Professional Programs and Training (PPAT) and the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) continues their more than 25-year-old partnership by signing a five-year renewal contract for EMU to be an OSHA Training Institute (OTI) Education Center.
- The latest episode of EMU Today TV features EMU alumni who are making a difference in their businesses and communities. Segment one features Morgan Iverson, a 2022 graduate in computer science. Iverson is a Software Engineer at VMWare in Palo Alto, Calif. Iverson shares her story about being recruited to Eastern to compete in women's track and field and working as a tutor in the Computer Science Department, before graduating and starting her career. Segment two features Courtney Smith, a 2014 graduate in sociology. Smith is President and CEO of the
