Regent Sidhu opened the meeting at 10:30am. Committee members introduced themselves. The minutes from December 7, 2023 were approved.

Student Government Presentation

Syed Wasiuddin, Student Body President, shared an update about the things that Student Government has been working on. The focus of Student Government has been promoting a sense of belonging for students. This has been done in various ways, including providing free bus passes to students, supporting the textbook affordability initiative, contributing to Swoops Pantry and the Student Emergency Fund, working with the Department of Public Safety to provide RAD self-defense courses, paying for campus wide access to the New York Times, encouraging the use of Ozzi reusable food containers, and funding student organization events.

Approximately 500 bus passes were provided to EMU this academic year. An email will soon be sent to students, reminding them that they have free access to the New York Times. Many have already taken advantage of this opportunity, and have read close to 60,000 articles.

Future Student Government initiatives include encouraging voter registration, hosting a statewide Student Government conference and overseeing the 2024 Student Government elections.

Regent Ford asked about the goals for the 2024 elections, and offered to assist. Lucas Langdon, Director of Campus Life, thanked Student Body President Wasiuddin for his service. Regent Sidhu echoed this sentiment and thanked him for making EMU a welcome place for everyone.

EMU Registration Blitz: An Application of the Principles of Caring & Belonging

Calvin McFarland, Associate Vice President for Student Success and Academic Support Services, shared a presentation about the EMU Registration Blitz. The goal of this event was to provide students with access to information, and assistance from many departments, in one location. In addition to Advising staff, 27 other departments participated in this event. The format was designed to reduce student anxiety and remove barriers related to the registration process.

The event was held on November 16, 2023, and a total of 495 students received advising. Of these 495 students, 355 were students receiving advising for the first time.

EMU students now have access to the Financial Empowerment Center, which is funded through Washtenaw County. Staff from this Center, located in Room 200 of McKenny, provide students and the surrounding community with financial counseling and credit report analysis. This is a joint effort with the EMU Engage Office.

Many helpful videos, covering topics such as how to register for classes, articulation agreements, navigating online classes and applying for graduation, are available to students. These tutorials are located on the Advising pages of the University Advising and Career Development Center website.

Another Registration Blitz is planned for March 2024. The goal is to include more academic departments at this event.

A video, sharing the experiences of two graduate assistants working in the Advising Office, was shown. Both students are in the Higher Education Student Affairs master's program.

Regent Ford asked how often the registration blitz events will occur. Associate Vice President McFarland replied that they will occur as needed, with the goal to empower students to complete registration tasks on their own. Rylee Clairday stated that she has been a student at EMU for four years. She knows that there are resources, but many students are not aware of them. These events are good to reach students and share this information with them.

Regent Sidhu stated that it is clear that Associate Vice President McFarland and other staff put students first. She asked what is being done to engage transfer students. Vice President McFarland replied that there is an online platform for transfer students, and they are working with Enrollment Management to improve this process.

Regent Ford thanked Regent Sidhu for a wonderful meeting. Regent Sidhu thanked everyone who attended, those who worked on the presentation, and the IT Department.

The meeting adjourned at 11:11am.

- Provide a common platform for dissemination of resources, information, and policies.






